Big decisions for our water services



There's a very big piece of Council work open now for feedback, and it's about services that we mostly take for granted.

Local Water Done Well is a Governmentled programme aimed at ensuring that councils around the country all deliver the same high quality drinking water, wastewater and stormwater services to their communities.

When it comes to pipes and plants, we're in good shape compared to other areas of New Zealand. Water services have historically been done well here in the Ashburton District – those people on urban schemes can happily drink water from the tap knowing it is safe, and happily flush their toilet knowing the wastewater is properly treated and disposed of.

So there's a chance that when the consultation documents arrive in your letterbox, you might think we're already doing a good job and not open the pack. I urge you to open it – these decisions required by Local Water Done Well are the biggest decisions Council will make in many, many years, so it's important to hear your feedback.

Council is proposing an inhouse standalone business unit to deliver water services in the future, partly based on what residents have told us over recent years about the need to retain strong Council control over this work and ownership of the asset.

Despite our good work this far, we know that further investment will be needed in water services to meet future regulation and Council must do the very best it can to achieve compliance. The reality is ratepayers will pay more for these water services in the future.

Going online and having your say is the easiest way. If you don't want to comment, then at least reading the document will give you an appreciation of the infrastructure and money involved in the smooth operation of our water services.

Another piece of important work, especially for Methven, is in its final week of consultation. We want to hear what people think about the proposed Methven community strategic plan, which sets out the town's aspirations for the next 10 years.

Reception spaces to merge at AAGM

The Ashburton Art Gallery and Museum will close for two weeks after the April school holidays to combine two reception areas into one on the ground floor and create new exhibition space on the upper

While the facility is closed to the public, staff will be busy helping with the renovations and installing four new exhibitions in the upstairs space.

Facility director Shirin Khosraviani said the post-holiday period was usually quieter and so it was the ideal time to do the minor renovations, which were approved as part of the Long Term Plan 2024-34.

"We'll create one shared reception and retail space for both heritage and art functions on the ground floor and convert the retail space upstairs into a fourth exhibition space, which will be a permanent home for art and objects from our local civic and pictorial collections.

"Then we'll be re-opening on Saturday 10 May and looking forward to showing off the new space to our regular and new

The renovation project will cost around \$60,000 and staff have reduced costs by designing the new space inhouse and doing some of the painting work.

"We're very used to repairing and repainting the exhibition walls every time there is a new display and so we're looking forward to using our skills in a wider

capacity. Interestingly, the original design of the building was for four exhibition spaces upstairs and it will be great to have some of our collection pieces on show alongside temporary exhibitions.

The art gallery and museum facility opened 10 years ago, running as separate operations by separate organisations. Both are now Council controlled and operate as one, and there are 14 staff and 35 volunteers who work there.

Ms Khosraviani said having just one reception at the ground entry point would improve the experience for visitors and make staff more visible.

"This will make the whole facility more welcoming and visitors will get a better insight into all the exhibitions, upstairs

and downstairs."

Bench tops and shelving from the facility is being sold or repurposed where possible - with some going to the Mt Hutt Memorial

The Ashburton District Family History Group that operates from the facility will also close for the two-week renovation period, though members of the public can still contact them on ashdfhg@gmail.com or through their website www.ashdfhg.

Bradfords and other local subcontractors have been awarded the contract for the renovations.

The closure period is from Monday 28 April to Friday 9 May.

Keep an eye on your mailbox for an important letter from Mayor Neil Brown about the future delivery of drinking water, wastewater and stormwater services in our district.

The biggest changes in years are on their way because of the Government's Local Water Done Well legislation and everyone in the Ashburton District is being invited to have their say on what happens here.

The mayor's letter will arrive with a consultation document outlining how Council proposes to deliver its water services - we've used plain language to describe Council's proposal, which is for an inhouse stand-alone business unit.

This model is an enhanced model of how Council already delivers three waters services, and will be ringfenced financially - meaning money collected from ratepayers for water services is kept separately from other Council work and spent only on water services work.

The information pack also describes an alternative option, a Water Services Council Controlled Organisation – which would be like ACL, but for water services.

A CCO would operate independently with



its own governance and management structure, with Council as its shareholder. A board of directors would need to be appointed and set up costs would be slightly more than the enhanced inhouse model.

Urban areas will receive their letters this week, and rural areas next week, but if you don't receive one, then call into the Council building for a paper copy or view it online at itsourplace.nz. The itsourplace. nz website also has a place for frequently asked questions and answers.
