A COMMENT:

A new year and a new start to this New Year. So, just what is new! There is our own Prime minister who has chosen to reshuffle the parliamentary cabinet and add a new portfolio, a minister of the South Island. That sounds good news for the South Island, although now that it appears confirmed that Ashburton will get its long campaigned for second bridge. I am certain there are several other issues to pursue which could bring substantial benefit to this Island of ours. What about the Cook Strait ferry conundrum! 1962 the first roll on come rail ferry went into service, the Aramoana a 4000-ton vessel which proved a great success, it crossed in all manner of weather, never seemed to break down and was in its time a revolution. It was built for the purpose and achieved that purpose over its lifetime on Cook Strait. By contrast the current fleet of vessels being castoffs from other countries. They are much larger now 22,000 tons and more, faster I guess, but regulations prevent faster travel in the Marlborough Sounds.

They travel what I would describe as an indirect route. But that is the only way to get from Wellington to Picton. An alternative landing point in the South has been suggested but that is as far as it has got. Clifford Bay near Seddon on the East Coast surely is an obvious choice. A ferry terminal would have to be built, once established this would be a great freight and passenger landing point. The ferry journey would be considerably reduced and the road journey south reduced by 52 km or 43 minutes. Is this worth pursuing, I would think so, what a wonderful issue for our member of parliament and South Island representative James Meager to get his teeth into. When I Googled this issue, I noted other suggestions, for example a bridge! Or maybe a tunnel, I doubt that either would be likely to happen; perhaps the Chinese could build something like that for us, after all Mr. Trump tells us they run the Panama Canal. They just may have the expertise required. But for now, I would pursue the Clifford Bay option. It would be a good subject to discuss with our MP James Meager.

My summer reading has been yet another Ken Follett historic novel. Like many if not all his other novels it is described as

'The No. 1 International Bestseller.' The title 'The Armour of Light' and set in the fictitious industrious town of Kingsbridge England. The story covers that period of English history from 1792 to 1815. This was the long period of war that was largely between England and France, what is often described as the 100 year war, although it had lasted for something like 23 years, a very long war. England was short of soldiers and the latest method of recruiting other than just grabbing was for the courts rather than hang a criminal send him to war where frequently they perished as poorly trained and equipped soldiers. This book ends in 1815 which is the Battle of Waterloo, the final battle of the French wars and Nepoleon Bonaparte's final battle. The French had largely moved on from Napoleon I as Emperor of France. He had been heavily defeated in his war with Russia. Although discarded by his people he was successful in reforming an army and taking the French to war against the British and Prussians, allies. As history tells us Britian, and their Prussian allies were successful in defeating Napoleon's army. The British marched into Paris, Nepoleon Bonaparte abdicated for the second time and was imprisoned this time on the remote mid-Atlantic Island of St Helena just two thousand miles west of Cape Town and two thousand five hundred miles east of Rio de Janeiro.

Nepoleon lived out his days on the island of St Helena he died on 5th of May 1821at the age of fifty-one. Eventually in 1840 his remains were returned to France and laid to rest in Paris.

I researched Nepoleon a little wondering if there was any comparison to Donald Trump. The historians have described Nepoleon as a very motivated leader very capable when the issue was to assemble large armies and take them to war. He had notable success in extending the boundaries of the French empire. That was until he took on the Russian empire. He had gathered an army of 800,000 men and horses when entering Russia, he was not so much defeated but was more outwitted by the military power and wit of Russia. Nepoleon was described as very intelligent; does he compare with Trump? I don't think so, we are comparing very different times in history, perhaps this is a comparison we should not attempt.





Book of the Month – Mt Somers Library

Title: 'Open Throat' Author: Henry Hoke Publication year: 2023 A review by Elles Smallegoor

The Mayfield area has its black panther. For over a decade, the Hollywood Hills in Los Angeles had a mountain lion. A bit less elusive than its New Zealand counterpart, the lion was often spotted in the hills by locals and, after caught and released by wildlife researchers, named P-22 and given an electronic neck collar. He lived in the hills until his death in 2022, when he was euthanised after suffering from health issues (source: en-wikipedia.ord/wiki/P-22). Famously captured on camera under the Hollywood sign by a National Geographic photographer, P-22 became incredibly loved and popular in American culture and inspired songs, television series and

books. One of these is Henry Hoke's 'Open Throat', a book that is not quite a novella nor a booklength poem, but more a hybrid of the two. In the acknowledgements, Hoke writes "This book is for P-22, who walks beside me in dreams" (p. 160).

The lyrical story is written from the perspective of a big cat-like creature, and from the first page, the reader falls straight into his thoughts: "I've never eaten a person but today I might" (p.3). His thicket is in a place the humans call "ellay" and he shares his day-to-day experiences and observations with us in short sentences or brief paragraphs, often quoting hikers, whose conversations in the Hollywood hills give LA its character. When two men set fire to a homeless encampment in the bush that functioned as the lion's safe haven to get water and food scraps, and the fire turns into a huge blaze, he flees his natural surroundings of thickets and caves and enters the urban, human world of highways (or "long deaths" as he calls them), houses, zoos and frightened people. His only friend there is Jane, a frustrated teenager who identifies him as female and adopts him as her

goddess. From here, the story enters the realm of fantasy and surrealism and the boundaries between the animal and the human world start to fade, opening up a space for us to ask some serious moral questions about identity and the human impact upon the natural world. Who is the prey and who the predator? What is good and what is bad?

Each page of the book looks like a poem, and some of the lion's phrases are beautiful and confronting when printed on the page in isolation. After overhearing a series of superficial conversations by passers-by he says: "I want to devour their sound/I have so much language in my brain/and nowhere to put it/I spend half the night dragging my deer up the hill to the clifftop/ to find some quiet" (p. 51). None of the sentences start with capital letters or end with full stops, adding to the sense that this is a creature communicating to us a world that is shared but yet differently inhabited. By choosing P-22 (or someone like P-22) as the protagonist, Hoke enables us to look at the encounter between the natural and the human world in a fresh manner.

How to Manage a Terminal Diagnosis

Coping with the news

Learning that you have a life-limiting illness is one of the most distressing and difficult events that can happen. Managing your feelings in those first few weeks can be challenging, and the suggestions below may help you and your loved ones navigate this minefield and move forward.

First Reactions

There is no right or wrong way for people to feel when they receive such a diagnosis. Hearing that your illness cannot be cured can be a frightening experience – and at first, it can be difficult to take everything in.

Give yourself the time to take in what is happening. You might want to be on your own. Or you might need to spend time with your partner, family or friends, to help you process the news. You may experience a range of emotions from fear and anger to relief and acceptance. This is normal.

As hard as it can be, try not to push your emotions aside completely. At some point, it's better to acknowledge your feelings, even if it's uncomfortable and hard to cope with.

Telling others

Sharing the news with others is not easy. Think about who you want to tell about the diagnosis. The first people you talk with are often those you are emotionally close to.

Tell who you want or need to tell, and don't feel pressured to tell anyone else. Remember too that you don't need to share all the details of the diagnosis with everyone. You can tell them as much or as little as you wish.

At some stage, you will need to inform those people who will help you "put your affairs in order" – your lawyer, financial advisor, accountant and healthcare providers.





Every place has two stories, the story that's written and the story that everyone knows. As the new Rural Minister for Mid-Canterbury I hope I will be able to learn the story that everyone knows, to become a part of the community and learn the history and know the people, to understand the way of life here and what's important to the community.

So getting stuck in and seeing what happens is pretty much all I've known.

Pretty much anywhere you go there will be two historic features of the community, the church and the pub, the last church in Mt. Somers' is 125 this year so we should probably celebrate at some point. I hope you will share the story of this place that everyone knows with me (please do actually have a chat with me sometime soon), you don't have to wait for a christening or a funeral to get in touch with the minister, feel free to anytime. 


