Local approach for future of water

Council is set to formally begin work on its Water Services Delivery Plan under the Government's Local Water Done Well legislation.

Mayor Neil Brown said Council is looking at what will hold Mid Canterbury in the strongest position.

"All of the water delivery options we're looking at have to be financially sustainable and will be regulated by the Commerce Commission.

"The new way of delivering water will have to be financially ring-fenced which means that all water costs and income must be kept separate from other council services.

"Council is leaning towards local Mid Canterbury solutions", he said.

Three local options include an in-house model, a single-Council CCO model or a single-Council CCO with an existing local Board-governed entity.

A single-Council controlled organisation would see a new organisation set up under the control of Council. Water CCO's can borrow up to 500% of their operating revenue from the Local Government Funding Agency (LGFA).

Canterbury is being explored, which could involve working with local utiliities provider, EA Networks.

Community consultation on shortlisted options is earmarked for early next year.

Water Services Delivery Plans are due to be submitted to the Department of Internal Affairs by August 2025 and will be subject to the approval of the Minister for Local Government.

EXERCISE PANDORA

Council staff and volunteers are preparing to take part in a major Civil Defence exercise on Thursday 7 November. Pandora will also be the first large-scale test for the newly-built **Emergency Operations Centre** (EOC) at Te Whare Whakatere. 60 Celebrating 160 Years of the Ashburton Domain

The Ashburton Domain is marking 160 years with two special events over summer, and one involves an outdoor movie.

The movie on Saturday 23 November will be held on the grass area near the paddling pool, at the corner of West and Walnut Streets.

The second event is a heritage sound trail that will run all summer and visitors to the domain can scan QR codes and listen to stories about the domain's past. The stories have been recorded by wellknown local radio announcer Peter Mac (McQuarters).

Open Spaces Manager Ian Soper said the domain had packed a lot into its 160 years.

"It was once known as the Grange and described as a scrubby wilderness, but over the years it has been developed and improved for recreation and sport, and is truly one of the South Island's premier parks.

"It is an important place for the local community and visitors and the Open Spaces team takes a lot of pride in managing the space with the domain's original values and intent front of mind.

"The Ashburton Domain is the gem in Ashburton's crown and we're pleased to be having some events to mark 160 years. I hope the community joins in."

New points of interest include the conifer collection that has been developed near the ponds at the corner of West and Wills Street, a new herb garden and the expansion of the butterfly and wildflower garden. The butterfly garden was the domain's aviary until 2021, when the birds were relocated and the area repaved and replanted to encourage butterflies and other biodiversity.

One of the old aviaries is being developed to display a collection of historic gardening equipment.
