New property valuations coming

Ashburton property owners will soon receive new three-yearly rating valuations in the post.

Updated values have been prepared for all 16,608 properties in the district by independent valuers Quotable Value (QV) on behalf of Ashburton District Council. They reflect the likely price a property would have sold for on 1 July 2024, not including chattels.

Since the district's last revaluation in 2021, the value of residential housing has increased by an average of 17%. The average house value is now at \$592,000, while the corresponding average land value has increased by 19% to a new average of \$241,000.

QV valuer Jeremy Clayton said the Ashburton property market had remained relatively stable over the past two years.

"While a majority of properties will be seeing an increase above 2021 value levels, much of this value growth took place in 2022, with the market remaining fairly stable since this time.

"The relative affordability of the Ashburton housing market means that value levels have fared relatively well by national standards. Whereas other parts of the country are seeing values fall, Ashburton has still seen overall growth since 2021."

If owners do not agree with their rating valuation, they have a right to object



through the objection process before 25 October 2024.

Land values on land zoned for higher-density development (Residential A and Residential B) around central Ashburton have significantly increased in value since 2021. Sites that have seen the greatest appreciation are generally 700 square metres or larger and offer strong development potential. This increase in value is supported by recent development sales since the last revaluation.

"While properties in these areas might experience a decrease in the value of improvements, this is not explicitly calculated but rather reflects the residual component of the Capital Value after subtracting the Land Value," Mr Clayton said

The average capital value of an improved lifestyle property has increased by 15% to \$970,000, while the corresponding land value for a lifestyle property increased by 12% to \$493,000.

How do valuations affect rates?

A lift in the district's property values does not increase the total amount of rates that Council collects. Instead, it helps determine the portion of rates that each property pays.

Delivering the basics is already work in progress

There's been a lot of talk recently about Prime Minister Chris Luxon's comments at a recent Local Government New Zealand conference - he gave us a shot across the bow and urged us to "deliver the basics brilliantly".

He highlighted three areas of special focus: Water, roads and housing.

Our MP James Meager has reinforced Mr Luxon's comments but says they were not directed at our Council.

To that end, I would like to reassure people that we have continued to undertake work ensuring our drinking water, wastewater and stormwater meet national standards.

Over the past three years we have built new water treatment plants at Methven and Mount Somers and spent millions more meeting and maintaining standards in water management, and over the next 12 months we intend to spend another \$15 million on installing ultraviolet disinfection equipment on our other drinking water supplies.

We are also heavily invested in ensuring the management of our wastewater not only reflects our commitment to minimal impact on the environment, but also meets national standards; likewise for our stormwater.

Our district has a vast roading network (1100km sealed and 1500km unsealed) and we have budgeted to spend about \$20 million on our roads, including the addition of unsubsidised work (that does not attract the government's 51% Funding Assistance Rate). To keep our rural roads maintained to a high standard, we have committed to ensuring about 50 tonnes of shingle is applied annually to maintain these for our community.

We feel community housing is best managed by people skilled in this sector, and actively support agencies in providing housing. This reflects what our community told us during consultation in 2020.

Council is making sure its elderly

people housing stock meets healthy homes standards and rebuilding a significant number for the people in our community who need it.

The necessities are essential for our town to function, but we were also able to celebrate the diversity in our community by sharing a wonderful evening of food and entertainment at the Hakatere Noodle Festival last Saturday night. Our new space in front of the council building provided an ideal background for this event.

A vibrant and healthy community benefits from a solid infrastructure base but also flourishes when we have opportunities to enjoy each other's company and celebrate the diversity skills in our district.

Before I sign off, I would also like to do a big plug for the wonderful exhibition at the art gallery and museum from the Ashburton Embroiderers' Guild incredible skill to produce such delicate and impressive works. Please go if you have time, you won't regret it.

Noodles foster welcoming vibes

Organisers were pleased with the success of the Hakatere Noodle Festival, with an estimated 6000 people attending on Saturday despite wild weather earlier in the day.

Council Group Manager for Democracy and Engagement, Toni Durham, said it was great to see such a wide range of the community enjoying themselves.

"Apart from a brief spot of rain, the weather behaved itself and it was fantastic to see so many visitors getting a taste for the cultures that make up our district."

Toni says the festival improved on last year's formula, with more vendors, longer hours and a larger venue.

"The atmosphere was really relaxed, the queues were shorter, and the redeveloped Baring Square provided a really pleasant space for our community to spend time together.
